

Post & Parcel: Swiss Post has called off the launch of its "personalised" newspaper project, after a disappointing response from customers. Swiss Post had been working with 11 national and international publishers on the project, with personalised newspapers digitally printed overnight at the Härkingen Letter Centre and delivered to major urban centres in Switzerland the day after an order is placed. MyNewspaper was one way to combine the physical with the digital communications channel in a hybrid mail product sending information digitally to be turned into a physical mail delivery. The personalised newspaper was also available in digital form anywhere in the world. Industry Today: Skillweb has launched a new real-time planning tool to enable courier, parcel and postal organisations to reduce the time required to schedule and manage timedefinite and same-day deliveries by as much as 75 per cent. The innovative solution is an extension to the company's end-to-end item tracking solution Houndit Enterprise and will provide the ability to better coordinate



deliveries and collections within strict time windows and service level agreements. The system will provide

- Revised PostCom Standard Mail flat price charts comparison.
- The Postal Regulatory Commission, last week, found that the prices for four market dominant product categories were consistent with US Code and could be put into effect. However, it found the Standard Mail flats prices failed to satisfy the Commission's directives in the FY2010 Annual Compliance Determination. So the PRC remanded the Standard Mail price adjustments to the US to allow them to submitted revised

- prices. The Postal Service as filed with the Postal Regulatory Commission its revised Standard Mail flat prices.
- The Postal Service published its unaudited October results with the Postal Regulatory Commission. USPS earned \$61 million in October 2012, which is the first monthly controllable income since October of last year. The Postal Service's controllable operating income for the month was \$286 million. The Postal Service Retiree Health Benefit Fund had a prepayment of \$467 million and a workers compensation adjustment of a negative \$257 million, which help offset the monthly prefunding amount. The month of October is part of the Postal Service's fall mailing season, which traditionally is its highest volume months throughout the year.
- The Postal Service's President of Digital Services, Paul Vogel, this week updated the Mailers Technical Advisory Council with its ongoing digital strategy. With the introduction of the Digital Services Group, the Postal Service plans on establishing a digital relationship with customers by becoming a platform business.
- The Postal Service has filed its 2013 Integrated Financial Plan (IFP), which provides the financial projections for the upcoming fiscal year. The USPS's fiscal year runs from October 1 thru September 30. For FY2013, the Postal Service projected an operating loss of \$2.0 billion, down from the FY2012 actual operating loss of \$2.4 billion. The net loss projection for FY2013 is \$7.6 billion compared to the actual FY2012 net loss of \$15.9 billion.
- The USPS and industry at this week's Mailers Technical Advisory Committee (MTAC) meeting jointly reviewed the activities taken around Hurricane Sandy, noting lessons learned and improvements that could be made in the disaster recovery process. While industry largely commended the USPS for its handling of the situations that arose during and following the hurricane, there were some lessons learned and recommendations for improvements in the processes, particularly in the area of communications.
- The USPS earlier this week at the Mailers Technical Advisory Committee (MTAC) meeting noted that it has published and posted on its RIBBS web site the list of facility consolidations it has planned for the next phase of its network changes. The USPS cautioned, however, that the list is "dynamic" and changes could be made. USPS chief operating officer Megan Brennan told the MTAC group that the USPS would give mailers at least 30 days notice of changes, noting that the USPS continues to look at opportunities for consolidations. She said the USPS is aggressively preparing for the next round of facility consolidations to begin in January/February 2013 and run through the early spring.

RIA Novosti: It has endured for more than two centuries amid technological revolutions, civil wars, and tectonic shifts in society and geography. But the days may be numbered for America's national postal service if the US Congress doesn't act fast. Conservative-minded critics—including Republican lawmakers—call the agency an unwieldy, inefficient behemoth incapable of competing with private couriers like FedEx and United Parcel Service (UPS). American taxpayers, they say, should not act as a fiscal backstop if it can't survive on the open market. Lorelei St. James, director of physical infrastructure issues at the US Government Accountability Office (GAO) [said] her agency plans to release a report early next month assessing various proposals by US lawmakers to deal with the postal service's retiree benefits funding, said St. James, the GAO's point person for postal issues. The 2013 Mailing Service Promotions Calendar includes:

Mobile Coupon/Click-to-Call: This promotion provides an upfront 2 percent postage discount on the integration of mail with mobile technology and will promote the value of direct mail in two ways. First, it will encourage customers to integrate hard-copy coupons in the mail with mobile platforms for redemption. Second, it will drive consumer awareness and increase usage of mail with mobile barcodes that provide click-to-call functionality. Registration is Jan. 15, 2013, to April 30, 2013.

Earned Value Reply Mail Promotion: First-Class Mail Business Reply and Courtesy Reply mailers will receive a \$0.02 postage credit for each Business Reply Mail (BRM) or Courtesy Reply Mail (CRM) piece that is scanned in the postal network. This promotion is designed to encourage mailers to promote First-Class Mail as a primary reply mechanism for their customers and to keep the CRM/BRM envelopes in their outgoing mail pieces by providing a financial benefit when the CRM/BRM envelopes are used. Registration is Jan. 1, 2013, to March 31, 2013.

Emerging Technologies: Providing an upfront 2 percent postage discount, this promotion is designed to build on the successes of past mobile barcode promotions in promoting awareness of how innovative technologies, such as Near-Field Communication, Augmented Reality, and Authentication can be integrated with a direct mail strategy to enhance the value of direct mail. Registration is June 15, 2013, to Sept. 30, 2013.

Picture Permit: The Picture Permit promotion is designed to promote the use of picture permit imprint indicia, which can improve a mailpiece's visibility and impact as a marketing tool. First-Class Mail letters and cards will be discounted 1 cent per mailpiece, and Standard Mail letters and cards will be discounted 2 cents per mailpiece. Registration is June 15, 2013, to Sept. 30, 2013.

Product Samples: Designed to re-invigorate product sampling via the mail, the Product Samples promotion will provide mailers with a 5 percent upfront postage discount on qualifying mail that contains product samples. The promotion will raise awareness of the new "Simple Samples" pricing in Standard Mail, effective Jan. 27. Registration is May 1, 2013, to Sept. 30, 2013.

Mobile Buy-it-Now: This promotion provide mailers with an upfront 2 percent postage discount to encourage them to adopt and invest in technologies that enhance how consumers interact and engage with mail and demonstrate how direct mail combined with mobile technology can be a convenient method for consumers to do their holiday shopping. Registration is Sept. 15, 2013, to Dec. 31, 2013.

DMM Advisory: New Marking Standards for Parcels Containing Hazardous Materials Today the Federal Register published our Domestic Mail Manual (DMM®) final rule that revises mailing standards to adopt new mandatory marking standards for parcels containing mailable hazardous materials that will align with revised requirements provided by the Department of Transportation (DOT). This final rule also provides terminology and categorization changes in response to DOT's pending elimination of the "Other Regulated Material" (ORM-D) category and partial elimination of the "Consumer Commodity" category. The effective date is January 1, 2013.

Associated Press: The head of the financially struggling U.S. Postal Service says the agency must be allowed to

Patrick Donahoe tells "CBS This Morning" the agency isn't asking Congress for money. He says, "I think most
people don't realize, we're 100 percent self-sufficient. We pay our own way." But the postal chief notes the agency is
losing \$15.9 billion this year. Donahoe says the post office needs to refinance retirement health fund payments to \$1

Dead Tree Edition: Bolstered by election-related mailings, the U.S. Postal Service experienced something unusual in October profitability.
PIWorld: There has been a lot of talk lately about the "Fiscal Cliff." Many of us lack confidence that our lawmakers will unite to avoid a certain recession trigger. There hasn't been as much talk about our industry's own fiscal cliff: What happens if we don't get postal reform by the end of the year? Like so many in our industry, I'll admit that I've been asleep at the wheel, complacently assuming the problem will get solved. Unfortunately, this is far from assured. If we lack confidence that our lawmakers won't spin us into certain recession (clearly an issue tha will generate more press coverage, public outcry and legislative attention), how can we possibly delude ourselves into thinking they will come together on postal reform? The stakes are high for our industry, with 65 percent of AL print distributed through the USPS system. What would happen if the system shuts down? Within the next year, that is a REAL possibility and we must not continue to ignore it.
Wall Street Journal: The White House and congressional Democrats hardened their budget positions on Tuesday and signaled they are prepared for partisan jockeying before any agreement to block impending spending cuts and tax increases can be reached with Republicans.
Isle of Wight County Press: ROYAL Mail services on the Isle of Wight could be seriously affected if the company closes its Portsmouth mail centre, it has been warned. The firm has announced it will carry out a review of the branch from January, throwing its future into doubt and putting 380 jobs at risk. Royal Mail said it was reviewing services following a drop in the number of letters being sent to Portsmouth but concerns have been raised that no other mail centre in the country has survived a review.

Federal Times: The U.S. Postal Service may have its problems, but they evidently weren't severe enough to persuade many supervisors and administrators to jump at an early retirement offer. Out of 3,594 Executive and Administrative Schedule employees eligible for the package, just 186 signed up by the Nov. 19 deadline, according to Postal Service figures provided today. The package—standard for the federal government—allows employees to retire early if they are at least 50 years old with a minimum of 20 years' service, or any age with at least 25 years' service. Unlike recent early retirement offers to postmasters, mail handlers and clerks, however, this one was not coupled with a cash incentive (i.e., buyout).

Post & Parcel: Jersey Post and Guernsey Post are being set targets to deliver 95% of all local mail within one working day, under new joint service standards proposed by regulators. The two Channel Island postal operators are also expected to deliver 99% of local mail within three working days.
Bloomberg: While the Hostess Twinkie may not be as central to the U.S. economy as the mail, Postmaster General Patrick Donahoe sees uncomfortable parallels of iconic products within unworkable organizational structures. "Companies and industries have gone over their own fiscal cliff because they can't sit down and work out their differences," Donahoe said in an interview last week. "Like Hostess." Like Hostess Brands Inc., where a labor impasse prompted the snack-food maker's liquidation, the Postal Service, with 28 times Hostess's workforce of 18,000, has been squeezed by labor costs and changing consumer tastes to the brink of extinction. The post office's insolvency is less imminent while no less ominous, with Donahoe projecting that the service expects to run out of cash in October without intervention from Congress. "They're in a box," said Gene Del Polito, president of the Association for Postal Commerce, which represents mailers including Williams-Sonoma Inc. and JPMorgan Chase & Co. "There's no way out unless Congress is willing to get rid of the box. Just about every option they need to explore to reinvigorate themselves as a viable enterprise aren't available to them." Turnaround specialists would be full of easy answers if the service were a private-sector company. The Postal Service is supposed to make a profit while operating as a government agency overseen by lawmakers who derive their authority over postal operations from the U.S. Constitution.

ETR# 107493 has been logged for this issue and the fix is being deployed on Monday, November 26, 2012. Data provisioning to mailers will resume normal service on Tuesday 11/27. Distribution of tray visibility data for the outage period (10/28 to 11/26) will gradually be replayed starting Wednesday 11/28 and is planned to complete by 12/17. During the investigation, an additional issue was identified, not related to the 10/28 release. The issue involved multiple tray visibility records with the same identifier preventing the data provisioning, which has been resolved allowing the data to be provisioned as stated above. To resolve the issue, the retention period of the tray visibility records was adjusted to match the PostalOne! 45 day retention period and aged records were purged.
Wall Street Journal: "Greece's Creditors Reach Aid Deal" [EdNote: We're still waiting for Congress to do something about postal reform.]
Nikkei Net Interactive: The government on Tuesday agreed to approve Japan Post Insurance Co.'s new educational endowment insurance offering, with eight specific conditions, following a meeting of several ministers

to discuss postal reform. Approval will be granted on Friday. One of the eight conditions, set by the government, requires Japan Post Insurance to resolve problems related to its failure to pay claims by policyholders. Educational insurance, one of four new Japan Post Group products under review for government approval, will be sold by as early as April.

Canada.com: The Canada Post Group of Companies reported Monday its sixth consecutive quarter of losses as mail volumes continue to decline amid a consumer shift away from paper-based communication. The company is struggling with an influx of consumers turning to online billing as well as using email for many correspondences. Canada Post said it must secure new collective agreements that will help it to compete.

Washington Times: The Postal Service is coming to grips with its diminished relevance in a digital society. The question is whether Congress will follow suit. Earlier this month, the Postal Regulatory Commission signed off on a test run for Metro Post, a scheme in which government mail would compete head-on with UPS and FedEx in providing same-day delivery service. Congress should cut the strings that tie the hands of the Postal Service, but not without first releasing taxpayers from the obligation of covering for the substantial losses when its operations flop. That means lawmakers should finally repeal the 140-year-old statutes that make it a crime for private companies to deliver first-class mail. Doing so puts consumers in charge of deciding what they're willing to pay for, and at what price. This ensures the public has access to the services they really need, not what Washington politicians think they should want.

The Commission's Order here ignores that Congressional intent. Under the PAEA, the Postal Service is primarily responsible for setting prices. The Postal Service fully complied with the Commission's directives concerning the pricing of Standard Mail Flats, and its statutory obligations, and the Commission therefore exceeded its authority when it declined to fully approve the price proposal of the Postal Service."

Assessment of the Viability of the Voyager Card Program for Highway Contractor Routes – 13XG012NO000 The Postal Service has been using the fleet transaction card from U.S. Bank Voyager Fleet Systems, Inc. to purchase fuel for its vehicle fleet since around 2000 (known as the Voyager Card Program). Stuff: Businesses wanting mail delivered with a one day turnaround could be staring at higher charges if NZ Post convinces the Government to accept a raft of changes to its deed of understanding. The changes are part a bid to reshape the state-owned company's business model, which has been trapped between mail volumes declining due to the internet and entrenched service delivery terms keeping costs high. As it stands, NZ Post is required to service 95 per cent of delivery points six days a week, a level it's looking to trim to three days. Jersey Evening Post: The Channel Islands Competition and Regulatory Authorities have released a draft decision on new postal targets for Jersey Post, with the company being expected to deliver 95% of all local mail within one working day. It also wants Jersey Post to deliver 82% of mail to Guernsey and the UK by the next working day and 97% within three business days. November 25, 2012 Huffington Post: Finding true "fat" in the government budget proves harder than it appears at first blush. Many commonly cited sources of "waste" like the National Endowment for the Arts, farm subsidies, and even individual weapons programs are just drops in the federal spending bucket. When one gets to the big spending programs, in fact, finding true waste is genuinely hard. But there's a big, big exception: A truly useless government agency with over a half million employees and \$66 billion in annual spending. It has offices in every town -- more, it says, than Starbucks, McDonald's, and Wal-Mart put together -- and it does something that nobody needs. The government agency, of course, is the United States Postal Service. While plenty of reforms seem to be on the table -- the Obama administration has called for the elimination of Saturday mail delivery and many conservatives want to go further -there's a strong case for simply ending the Postal Service altogether. Rather than tinkering around the edges, Congress and the Obama administration should seriously consider getting rid of the Post Office as it exists altogether by selling its brand and assets to the private sector and repealing its special privileges. Associated Press: When the next Congress cranks up in January, there will be more women, many new faces and 11 fewer tea party-backed House Republicans from the class of 2010 who sought a second term. Overriding those changes, though, is a thinning of pragmatic, centrist veterans in both parties. Among those leaving are some of the Senate's most pragmatic lawmakers, nearly half the House's centrist Blue Dog Democrats and several moderate House Republicans. That could leave the parties more polarized even as President Barack Obama and congressional

leaders talk up the cooperation needed to tackle complex, vexing problems such as curbing deficits, revamping tax laws and culling savings from Medicare and other costly, popular programs.
New York Post: The USPS is reporting a staggering \$15.9 billion loss for the fiscal year that ended Sept. 30 — more than triple its loss of the previous year. Indeed, only a late \$500 million influx of election campaign mail will end up saving the USPS from actually running out of cash at year's end. The real problem is that the Postal Service remains under the thumb of Congress — which refuses to act on meaningful, and necessary, reforms. As a short-term measure, Congress needs to reach agreement before the Postal Services falls over its own fiscal cliff. But long-term needs and ever-changing technology suggest more creative approaches are needed. Privatization may not be the answer, but it's time to have the conversation.
Express: The cost of sending a package in the UK is set to shoot up under controversial European Commission proposals. Its internal market commissioner Michel Barnier is poised to launch a consultation into the state of Europe's delivery market which will also look at costs to consumers. It is being hailed as a first step towards creating an EU-wide integrated parcel delivery market.
Winston-Salem Journal: The U.S. Postal Service has lowered its rate for priority mail flat boxes in an effort to help friends and family members of military personnel get their packages in time for holidays. The postal service is offering a discount for its largest Priority Mail Flat Rate Box at a price \$13.45, which includes a \$2 a box discount for military mail being sent to the Air/Army, the (Naval) Fleet and Diplomatic post offices to destinations worldwide, the postal service said. Priority Mail Flat Rate boxes are available at no costs at local U.S. Post Offices. They also can be ordered online at shop.usps.com. Postage, labels and customs forms can be printed online. Cards and packages to military addresses overseas should be sent Monday to Dec. 17 to ensure that this mail is delivered by Dec. 25, the postal service said.
Town Hall: According to the Hill, policymakers are "scrambling" to do something about the U.S. Postal Service in the current lame-duck session of Congress. The USPS's recently announced \$15.9 billion loss for 2012 apparently inspired policymakers to act. It's hardly a surprise that Congress has waited as long as it can to do something about the USPS. Interest in postal issues for most members probably doesn't go beyond naming post offices and franking. And regardless of whether Congress passes "reform" legislation in the lame-duck or next year, it will end up just kicking the can down the road. (Policy analysts who are frustrated with the inability of Congress to tackle entitlement reform would be wise to stay away from postal policy issue for mental health purposes.)
Gant Daily: People can count on the U.S. Postal Service to deliver the record amount of purchases 130 million Americans are expected to make on Cyber Monday, the biggest online spending day ever. According to the National Retail Federation (NRF), 51.8 percent of people will take advantage of Web-based sales and consumers can take advantage of the Postal Service's products and services.

The Financial: Deutsche Post DHL, the world's leading postal and logistics group,
has – for commercial reasons – canceled with immediate effect its long-standing
rating agreement with the rating agency Standard & Poor's (S&P).

Morning Sentinel: Despite the flood around the holidays, annual catalog circulation by retailers has actually dipped substantially because of a postage increase, a weak economy and more shoppers making purchases online. Nearly a third fewer catalogs are mailed than were four years ago. The precipitous drop in mailings followed a 23 percent average postage increase in 2007 for the category that includes standard-sized catalogs. Some catalog companies have gone out of business. Others drastically cut back on the number of catalogs, or reduced the number of pages, or both.
Sydney Morning Herald: It has been presented as a sort of axis of evil: a media triad - email, mobile phones, Twitter - that will supposedly lead to the death of handwriting. As British author Philip Hensher writes about the act of putting pen to paper in his new book, The Missing Ink: "It has started to become just one of many options, and often an unattractive, elaborate one." And yet, among the stories about the decline of personal letters sent with a stamp, and the dominance of electronic messages, a growing number of people are reviving handwriting in ways that are intimate and inventive.
Casper Star-Tribune: Beginning in 2011, 45 post offices faced closure in hamlets that many Wyomingites had never heard of, places like Arvada and Frontier and Otto. Jan. 12 will mark the first day the first group of post offices — Beulah, Hamilton, Slater, Bondurant, Fort Bridger, Fort Laramie, Freedom, Hartville, Robertson and Savery — will have fewer hours. Fewer hours of electricity, heating and cooling will certainly save the Postal Service money, but much of the savings will come through buyouts and early retirements to tens of thousands of employees. The Postal Service offered each postmaster in the country early retirement. The exact number of takers isn't known yet. People who live in affected communities should expect to see new faces at the post office. The Postal Service will hire new or substitute postmasters. Nationwide, the measures could save the Postal Service \$500 million.
ITV: Former High Court judge Sir Gordon Langley has recommended that new legislation should be introduced to provide tougher legal sanctions against owners of dangerous dogs. The report pointed out that action cannot be taken if an attack takes place on private property, limiting legal protection available to postmen and women. Sir Gordon's report called on the Government to repeal current legislation and provide a new statute so that legal action can be taken against dog owners, wherever an attack takes place.
MediaDailyNews: The second half of the year isn't bringing any relief to the newspaper industry, with total advertising revenues falling 5.1% from \$5.56 billion in the third quarter of 2011 to \$5.27 billion in the third quarter of 2012. Revenue declines were spread across all the major newspaper ad categories. National advertising fell 10.4% from \$823 million to \$738 million, retail was down 6% from \$2.8 billion to \$2.64 billion, and classifieds slipped 4.8% from \$1.2 billion to \$1.14 billion. [EdNote: Ooo! Ooo! I got it! Let's blame direct mail!]
Transport Intelligence: The United State Postal Service may have lost \$15.9bn in 2012, however there are some companies able to make a profit out of the shrinking postal sector. UK Mail Group, the British private sector postal service and parcel network provider, has announced six month results with year-on-year revenue up 11.9% and profit before tax up 21.4% at £7.3m; although this was flattered by exceptional items, with UK Mail stating that underlying growth was 7.8%. In its core mail business, which represents half of the Group's sales, revenue increased 23.6%, driven-up in part by price increases by Royal Mail. Stripping this out, however, revenue still grew by 17% on mail volumes that grew by 2%. UK Mail has been able to expand its market share by gaining customers from Royal Mail and creating new types of services such as a 'web-to-print' concept. The bad news was that the ability to pass on price increases was limited and this drove down margins, with profits up just 12.9% at £5.7m, whilst margins fell to 4.9% from last year's 5.4%.
Union Leader: The U.S. Postal Service has recorded a \$15.9 billion loss for the past fiscal year. Congress, not surprisingly, continues to compound the problem. Postmaster General Patrick Donahoe said, "It's critical that Congress do its part and pass comprehensive legislation before they adjourn this year." But he is wrong. This cannot become another taxpayer bailout. The taxpayers cannot be asked to subsidize an agency and workforce that cannot help itself. Congress needs to stop interfering in the process, make clear there will be no further bailouts, and allow the postal service to make the cuts necessary. The level may have to be reduced, but pre-funding for retiree benefits, (pensions and health care), remains essential - to protect the American public and the employees entitled to the benefits.

Computerworld: The Royal Mail Group has revealed plans to distribute up to 120,000 mobile devices to its staff under a new managed services deal worth up to £300 million.
Post & Parcel: Lithuania Post has said it has reduced its losses threefold during the first nine months of this year, which offers "grounds for optimism". The national postal service for the Baltic republic sustained losses of just over LTL 1m during the nine months to the end of September 2012, compared to losses of LTL 3.3m (EUR 960,000) during the same period last year, according to unaudited figures. Malta Today: Despite registering a €796,000 profit in the first half of their financial year from 1 October 2011 to 31 March 2012, MaltaPost has announced a substantial increase in its postal tariffs. Last week, MaltaPost revised its postal tariffs upwards, insisting that throughout 2012 it was negatively impacted by changes in the framework. Postal rates were raised substantially on Monday, with further increases set to follow in April 2013.
BBC: Workers at a Bristol postal sorting office have voted for a strike in a dispute over their workload. About 80% of workers at the Mead Street depot voted to stage walk outs. A meeting last week between Royal Mail and the Communication Workers Union (CWU) ended without agreement and more talks will take place on Friday.
The Association for Postal Commerce (PostCom) has responded to the Postal Service's proposed rulemaking concerning new mailing standards for domestic mailing services products effective with the January 2013 pricing changes, published by the USPS in the Federal Register on October 23, 2012.
Computerworld: Digital Post Australia (DPA) has fired the latest salvo in its battle with Australia Post to attract consumers and business to electronic postal services. The organisation announced Wednesday that its free Digital Postbox service was available to consumers and businesses, following successful beta testing in August with an undisclosed number of customers. While Australians can register for Australia Post's Digital Mailbox, it is believed this competing service won't be available for use until early 2013.

release of their new MailValidator application. This new service allows business mailers and their vendors to provide better postal data communication to GrayHair's current suite of cloud-based solutions.

Glen Falls Post-Star: Nostalgia doesn't get the mail delivered, so Congress should allow the Postal Service to enact the painful measures necessary for the service to survive as a business. If survival requires stopping mail delivery on Saturdays, closing and merging small community post offices and cutting hours at service windows, then those steps should be taken. Fewer people send first-class letters now than in the pre-Internet days, but that hasn't eliminated the need for mail services, nor made it impossible to run profitable postal businesses. UPS does it. So does FedEx. The Postal Service has been trimming the size of its workforce in recent years and increasing worker productivity. But congressional oversight has hamstrung its efforts to realize large savings through dramatic changes, such as eliminating Saturday service. Congress cannot demand the Postal Service both run at a profit and operate as a community service. If Congress wants to stop subsidizing billions of dollars in operating losses, then representatives like Bill Owens have to support closing tiny rural post offices, like those in Clemons and Keene Valley.
Investor Place: Black Friday might be making headlines this week, but many shoppers are trading in an early trip to brick-and-mortars for some simple online shopping. In fact, retail revenue on Cyber Monday — the Monday after Thanksgiving — could reach \$2 billion, according to Adobe's Online Shopping Forecast. That would make for growth of 18% year-over-year. That's especially good news for two non-retail names: FedEx and United Parcel Service. Because until someone invents a Star-Trek era transporter, retailers will need shipping companies to move those purchases. Both companies expect to see double-digit growth in terms of packages shipped this holiday season.
Federal News Radio: When Ellis Burgoyne started at the U.S. Postal Service in 1978, the idea of receiving mail online or tracking it via GPS was unimaginable. But today, the mail carrier turned chief information officer is leading a team of technologists and IT specialists making that a reality. At the top of Burgoyne's list is digitization of mail, the idea that every physical piece of mail can also live in some type of electronic format. "We are working very hard to try to get letters and flats and packages and mailing statements, and somehow convert them into digital form so we can apply technology to it," said Burgoyne. "Once you have it in a digital representation, you can do a lot with it. You could get a physical piece of mail and also get a digitized version of it in your smartphone or at your desktop. We actually have that technology available now. Burgoyne said this type of digitization will offer Postal Service customers a type of business intelligence they haven't had before. The Postal Service's Intelligent Mail barcode is the keystone of that effort.
Marketwatch: Postal operator Poste Italiane Wednesday won 1.56 billion euros (\$2 billion) compensation from the Italian government for public services delivered over 2009-2011.
The Capital Times: The U.S. Postal Service is in the midst of a manufactured crisis. It is supposedly broke and headed toward its own version of a fiscal cliff. If it goes over, the likely result is privatization of its profitable enterprises and elimination of the commitment to universal service that has been its promise since the founding of the republic. But that does not have to happen. Congress undermined the financial stability of the Postal Service during a lame-duck session six years ago. It can repair the damage done during this session. The task is not difficult. The lift is not heavy. It is merely a matter of will.
CEP News (Courier-Express-Postal), published by the MRU Consultancy, has reported that:
Austrian Post was able to improve its results, due to the good development of its Parcel & Logistics division and a stable mail business in the first three quarters of 2012. Deutsche Post still defends its identity check system against its competitors. After the post already refused to provide its Postident system to service provider United Internet for its De-Mail product, (among others CEP-News 50/10), the company now filed a complaint with the patent office against a patent for web-based identification of persons held by Cybits AG. Itella Information, the information logistics unit of the Finnish post, plans to increase its activities on the Polish market. Exactly one year after Canada's Supreme Court imposed a fine of 110m euros on Canada Post (CEP-News 47/11), the persons concerned still wait for their compensations. The e-commerce market in Austria and Switzerland continued to show dynamic growth and is highly concentrated.

E-Commerce is set to boom in France in 2012, too. French La Poste will increase its letter prices at the turn of the year. According to La Poste, prices will rise by 2.8% on average. A standard letter for example will cost 63 cents instead of the current 60 cents from January 1 2013 on. Prices for business clients will climb by 1.8% on average. La Poste increased letter postage in the middle of 2011. A parcel terminal network will be installed on the Iberian peninsular now, too. CEP service MRW (turnover 2011: 564.7m euros) now wants to install 'at least a few hundred parcel terminals' in Spain and Portugal, after a pilot test in Madrid and Barcelona yielded good results. The terminals will be provided by InPost, a subsidiary of Polish mail service Integer.pl, which receives a fixed leasing fee for each parcel locker.

People's World: While the U.S. Postal Service (USPS) was closed on Veterans Day, a group of Portland, Ore., postal employees used their day off to say that if USPS really wants to honor veterans, it should hire them. Hiring has been frozen for five years at USPS, and that's reducing opportunities for veterans returning from the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan.
Multichannel Merchant: Rates for standard mail flats – the category affecting catalog mailers – could rise even more next year after the Postal Regulatory Commission remanded the proposed 2.57% increase to the U.S. Postal Service for further consideration because the category fails to cover its attributable costs. This directive to the USPS stems from the PRC's Annual Compliance Determination report in 2011 that revealed in fiscal year 2010 standard mail flats failed to comply with the section of the Postal Accountability and Enhancement Act of 2006 requiring a fair and equitable apportionment of the cost of postal operations.

Ohio Newspaper Association: Benefits to community newspapers from the U.S. Postal Service's proposed mandatory use of a "full-service" Intelligent Mail Barcode (IMb) are meager and do not justify the substantial investment in the technology, the National Newspaper Association told the Postal Service Monday.
Post & Parcel: Polish Post said today it is lowering prices at its Pocztex courier services by up to 50% as it chases the ecommerce delivery market. The company, which has a small share of the Polish courier market at present, said it has been mounting a big push this autumn to become one of the top five courier firms in Poland, and that

developing its courier and express services is one of the top priorities of its strategy up to 2015. Polish Post is also looking to introduce new services as it looks to attract big new business customers like major ecommerce merchants, including delivery by 8am, online shipment tracking features and text message notification. Prices for Polish Post's individual courier customers should drop by an average of 35%, the company said.
Indiana Public Media: The U.S. Postal Service has partnered with local businesses around the state as a part of its cost-cutting measures. Fourteen so-called Village Post Offices have been created in Indiana, with more expected to open in the coming months. But the managers of some of those post offices have not yet seen the increase in business they were hoping to get out of the partnership.
Nhan Dan: The Ministry of Information and Communications (MIC) will hold the State-owned stake in the Vietnam Post Corporation from 2013, according to a decision by the Prime Minister. The Vietnam Post Corporation is a subsidiary of the Vietnam Post and Telecommunications Group (VNPT) and has charter capital of VND8.122 trillion (nearly US\$390 million). Under the PM's directive, VNPT will complete the transfer of ownership of the Vietnam Post Corporation to the MIC by January 1, 2013. The Vietnam Post Corporation provides mail, newspaper and parcel delivery services through the postal system, as well as telecommunications and financial services.
Business Daily Africa: The Communications Commission of Kenya (CCK) has ordered courier firms to raise their prices to the regulatory minimum in a move seen as meant to protect the troubled State-owned Postal Corporation of Kenya (PCK). The industry regulator has established Sh150 as the minimum fee chargeable by courier companies for parcels weighing under 350 grammes.
Post & Parcel: UK postal regulator Ofcom said today that growth in the Downstream Access mail market seems to be slowing, but it is keeping a close eye on the development of new end-to-end competition for Royal Mail.
Government Executive: The Federal-Postal Coalition a group representing more than two dozen federal employee unions pleaded with Congress on Monday to spare their members in any deal related to the fiscal cliff. Federal workers, the coalition wrote in a letter, have contributed more than their fair share toward reducing the debt and are the only group that has been targeted so heavily. "Federal and postal employees and their families are hardworking, middle-class Americans who are struggling during these tough times just like other Americans," the group wrote. "No other group has been asked to financially contribute the way they have, and it is time our nation's leaders found other ways to reduce the deficit than continually taking from those who have dedicated their lives to public service."
The Hill: The American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees (AFSCME), the National Education Association (NEA) and the Service Employees International Union (SEIU) will launch a series of radio and television ads on Tuesday that urges lawmakers to let the Bush tax rates for the wealthy expire while preserving entitlement benefits. Most observers in Washington expect a deal on the "fiscal cliff" to require compromise from both sides, but the messaging blitz puts the onus on Republicans to give ground on their signature issues of taxes. [EdNote: Keep your eye on this issue. If we're not saved from going over the fiscal cliff, don't expect anything to come of postal reform.]

Southwest Iowa News: With Congress still balking at any serious attempt at a "fix," the struggling U.S. Postal Service last week reported an annual loss of a record \$15.9 billion and forecast more red ink in 2013, capping a tumultuous year in which it was forced to default on billions in payments to avert bankruptcy. The ongoing inability – or unwillingness – of Congress to come to an agreement on Postal Service recommendations needs to be resolved quickly.
The Hill: With six weeks left in the current Congress, lawmakers are racing to finish legislation overhauling how the struggling U.S. Postal Service operates. Top members in both the House and the Senate met to try and carve out a path forward on Thursday, the same day the mail agency announced a record \$15.9 billion loss in fiscal 2012. The hope for those lawmakers is that, after working on shoring up USPS for much of the last two years, they can wrap up the issue before starting a new session. Members working on legislation have yet to spell out compromises on issues like how to fund future retirees' health care, and will also be looking to hammer out a postal agreement at the same time much of Washington is concentrating on the mix of spending cuts and tax hikes known as the fiscal cliff. With all that in mind, Rep. Elijah Cummings (Md.), the top Democrat on the House Oversight Committee, told The Hill that there was a "50-50" shot that this Congress would push through postal reform.



New York Times: In the past, a spymaster might have placed a flower pot with a red flag on his balcony or drawn a mark on page 20 of his mistress's newspaper. Instead, Mr. Petraeus used Gmail. And he got caught. Granted, most people don't have the Federal Bureau of Investigation sifting through their personal e-mails, but privacy experts say people grossly underestimate how transparent their digital communications have become.
National Association of Letter Carriers: On Thursday, Sen. Joseph Lieberman (I-CT), the retiring chairman of the Homeland Security and Government Affairs Committee, called a bipartisan meeting of House and Senate leaders to discuss his alarming idea to allow the U.S. Postal Service to end Saturday mail delivery service but retain package delivery service on that day. "While I'm sure Senator Lieberman's intentions are good, his notion not only is misguided, it falls into the trap of failing to address the root cause of problems the Postal Service continues to face," NALC President Fredric Rolando said. "In fact, his proposal completely ignores the 2006 congressional mandate to pre-fund 75 years' worth of future retiree health benefits and to do so within just 10 years." "This crisis, manufactured by Congress, is what's creating on Capitol Hill a false sense of urgency to act immediately," Rolando said. "There is no argument that something must be done to solve the Postal Service's financial problems, but Lieberman's so-called compromise would eliminate 25,000 city carrier jobs and drive more business away from the Postal Service by undermining the value of our service."
Times of Malta: Postal rates will rise substantially on Monday, with further increases following on April 1. Domestic registered mail will cost 90c, up from 49c, while international registered mail will increase to €2.25 from €1.40. Advice of delivery on international registered mail will now cost €1.75, an increase of €1.14. Other rates that will change in April include domestic postage, up 6c to 26c for a letter weighing up to 50 grams and 32c for a letter up to 100 grams. Each additional 50g will cost 20c, an increase of 11c.
New York Times: Democratic and Republican leaders of Congress emerged from their first budget meeting with President Obama at the White House at midday Friday and, in a rare show of bipartisan bonhomie, jointly expressed confidence that the two parties will reach an agreement before the end of the year to avert economy-rattling tax increases and across-the-board spending cuts.
RuralInfo.net: The NRLCA is hearing rumors that some congressional members may be willing to give up 6-day mail delivery for letters and flats for negotiating a deal that would get postal legislation passed by the end of the year. The compromise aims at getting some type of postal legislation completed during the Lame Duck Session. Currently postal legislation is not Congress' agenda or expected to-do-lists during the Lame Duck Session, but Lame Duck Sessions are notorious for surprises.
Courier, Express, and Postal Observer: Alan Ota, a senior writer for CQ Roll Call has reported on twitter that Senator Joseph Lieberman has offered a compromise on Postal reform to get the legislative process moving again. As Alan Ota's tweet indicates, Lieberman is willing to give up preservation of 6-day delivery for letters and flats in negotiating a postal reform bill with Congressman Darell Issa.
Reuters: United Parcel Service is raising net shipping rates by up to 4.9 percent in 2013, with smaller increases on air express services as it caters to customer demand for slower and cheaper shipping options. UPS next-day and 2nd day air freight rates within and between the United States, Canada and Puerto Rico will also rise 4.9 percent, down from 5.9 percent in 2012. The new rates take effect on December 31, UPS said.

The 2013 labeling list and mail direction file structured release cycle will go into effect beginning December 15, 2012. Labeling lists changes will be published four times per year to align with Postal Quarters. Mail direction file updates will occur six times a year: four of the updates will be on the same cycle as labeling lists, and two will occur outside of the Postal Quarters (the dates of the two out-of-Quarter updates will be provided at the end of each year for the following year). Mailers will be notified 15 days prior to upcoming labeling lists changes. The effective date of the labeling list will occur on the first day of a Postal Quarter. Mailers will have a 30-day period during which they may use either the old or the new labeling list to pre-sort the mail. Mailers will also have a 30-day period during which they can enter mail at the old or the new re-directed facility per the mail direction file. After the 30-day compliance period ends, mailers will need to use the new labeling list and mail direction file to properly induct the mail into the Postal Service's mail processing network. DMM Advisory: Extension of Deadline for Intelligent Mail Package Barcode Use to January 28, 2013 The Postal Service™ is extending the deadline for the mandatory use of Intelligent Mail® package barcodes (IMpb) to January 28, 2013, from our previously announced deadline of January 7, 2013. The January 7, 2013, mandatory-use date was first announced in the September 27, 2011, Federal Register final rule (76 FR 59504-59512) and also in the November 17, 2011, Postal Bulletin (PB 22324).

Money News: As President Barack Obama and congressional leaders prepared for budget and tax talks on Friday aimed at preventing the U.S. economy from falling back into recession next year, Democrats and Republicans dug in on their long-held opposing positions.
China Daily: For Hongkong Post, an organization that earns most of its revenue from traditional postal services, it is facing tough times as fewer people are writing to each other as in the past, and more people are turning to the Internet for their correspondences as well as for paying their bills.
Post & Parcel: Brazil Post has confirmed that it has begun its planned expansion abroad, with its first international office set to open in Miami early next year.
Easy Reader News: The United States Postal Service has been inundated with political mail in the past weeks, forcing mail carriers nationwide to work long hours walking the streets well past dark. Employees see the influx of mailers as a problem, but expanded routes as the real issue. They are worried the problem will persist throughout the high-volume holiday season.
Federal Times: About 20,000 U.S. Postal Service employees have so far signed up for the agency's latest early-out offer, Postmaster General Patrick Donahoe said Thursday. The offer, announced early last month, combines a \$15,000 buyout with an early retirement package for longer-serving workers. It is open to almost all of the 187,700 clerks, mechanics and other employees represented by the American Postal Workers Union.
Huffington Post: Worried about further pay freezes and pension cuts, the unions representing federal and postal workers have a message for legislators seeking a "grand bargain" on deficit reduction: Don't look to us for more savings. The looming cuts have kept labor unions in full-on campaign mode after the Nov. 6 election. "We're very nervous about Congress sort of zeroing in on postal employees' and federal employees' pensions and heath care," said Jim Sauber, chief of staff at the National Association of Letter Carriers, which has nearly 300,000 union members. "It's been an easy target. They've repeatedly gone to that well to pay for things in the past. I guess we're all willing to do our fair share, but so far this community has really been targeted."
Federal News Radio: The Postal Service lost \$15.9 billion in fiscal 2012, in a record-setting loss for the cash-strapped agency. But the troubling financial news began even earlier this week, when it was revealed that surplus payments the Postal Service made to the Federal Employee Retirement System are much smaller than once thought. USPS had wanted to use those overpayments to pay down some of its debts. Postmaster General Patrick Donahoe said the bad news underscores the urgent need for postal reform legislation and renewed his call for Congress to act in the lame-duck session.
KAAL: A malicious virus email claiming to be from the US Postal Service is attacking computers across the state. The email says there's been an attempted package delivery, by clicking on the link it installs a virus that can steal personal information.
Washington Post: If Congress needs practice on how to avoid the fiscal cliff facing the nation's finances, it can work on pulling the U.S. Postal Service out of a deep canyon of debt. As USPS losses fell to record levels last year, its productivity rose to new heights.

Press Release: During today's meeting of the U.S. Postal Service Board of Governors, Mickey D. Barnett was elected chairman and James H. Bilbray was elected vice chairman. Barnett, the Board's current vice chairman, will succeed Chairman Thurgood Marshall, Jr., who has served as chairman since December 2011 and whose term on the Board ends in December. Barnett and Bilbray will assume their new leadership roles during the Board's next meeting in December. Barnett is an attorney and former New Mexico state senator. He was appointed a governor by President George W. Bush on Aug. 17, 2006 for a term that expires Dec. 8, 2013. He currently serves as a member of the Audit and Finance Committee and the Compensation and Management Resources Committee. Bilbray is an attorney and former member of the U.S. House of Representatives from Nevada. He was appointed a governor by President George W. Bush on Aug. 17, 2006 and was reappointed on Dec. 15, 2006 by President Bush to an additional nine-year term that expires Dec. 8, 2015. He currently serves as the chairman of the Governance, Regulatory, and Strategic Planning Committee.
Washington Post: The struggling U.S. Postal Service on Thursday reported an annual loss of a record \$15.9 billion, capping a tumultuous year in which it was forced to default for the first time on billions in payments to avert bankruptcy. The financial losses for the fiscal year ending Sept. 30 compared to a \$5.1 billion loss in the previous year. See USPS Press Release.
BizJournals: Postal Service officials disclosed Thursday afternoon that they have about \$1 billion of cash on hand in its balance throughout the first half of the fiscal year that began Oct. 1. That could get even worse by sometime in October 2013. It's going to be down to about \$800 million — 3.5 days of operating cash — and could run out of cash during that month. "We are far short on liquidity," said Postal Service CFO Joseph Corbett.
Sen. Thomas Carper: Today, Sen. Tom Carper (D-Del.), chairman of the Senate subcommittee that oversees the U.S. Postal Service (and co-author of the 21st Century Postal Act), released the following reaction to the announcement that the U.S. Postal Service lost \$15.9 billion in the fourth quarter of fiscal year 2012:

"Since August, the U.S. Postal Service has defaulted on not one but two payments to the U.S. Treasury – a first for this ailing American institution. Furthermore, last month, the Postal Service reached its \$15 billion borrowing limit, and today the U.S. Postal Service's financial situation continued to spiral downward with the announcement that it lost \$15.9 billion in this final quarter of Fiscal Year 2012 – more than the rest of the year's losses combined. Nearly \$5 billion of these losses were operational and not related to the Postal Service's retiree health pre-funding payments. As the nation creeps toward the 'fiscal cliff,' the U.S. Postal Service is clearly marching toward a financial collapse of its own. The Postal Service's financial crisis is growing worse, not better. It is imperative that Congress get to work on this issue and find a solution immediately. I am hopeful that now that the elections are over my colleagues and I can come together and pass postal reform legislation so that a final bill can be signed into law by the end of the year."

Federal News Radio: Comprehensive cybersecurity legislation in the Senate is dead. Sen. Harry Reid (D-Nev.), the majority leader, Wednesday night pronounced the Cybersecurity Act of 2012 ran out of lives after it failed to gain 60 votes to end cloture. The Senate passed the motion to end cloture 51 to 47, but without three-fifths approval the bill cannot move forward to the debate and amendment portion of the process. "The bill that was and is the most important to the intelligence community and the Pentagon was just killed, and that was cybersecurity," Reid said. [EdNote: And we expect a postal bill to pass?]
Postalnews Blog: At the hearing on November 9, the Postal Service's lead advocate set forth the general outlines of the USPS arguments and evidence. What follows from these arguments is a series of draconian proposals from the Postal Service, including – for current mail handlers – absolutely no general wage increases, no cost-of-living adjustments, and a drastic increase in employee contributions for health insurance to the current rate paid by federal employees. Another proposal from the Postal Service seeks to substantially modify, and effectively eliminate, the current no lay-off clause. In addition, the Postal Service is seeking the authority to hire and to utilize, without any contractual restrictions on scheduling, use, or retention, a total of 25% non-career casual employees. Finally, for new career mail handlers hired in the future, the Postal Service proposes that their pay rates be 20% lower at the entry level and 20% lower at the maximum level. The bottom line is that the Postal Service seeks to freeze the wages for all current mail handlers, while reducing their take-home pay by approximately 8% to pay for health insurance premiums. For new hires, the USPS proposal would mean a permanent, non-career workforce with low pay and no benefits for one-quarter of employees performing mail handler work, and a reduction of 20% in the wages of newly hired career mail handlers.

 The PRC'S application of 39 U.S.C. § 3622(e) to limit the price difference of separate products is abitrary and capricious. the PRC's interpretation of section 3622(e) is inconsistent with the language and structure of the PAEA and with the PRC's previous orders. The PRC's overly broad interpretation frustrates Congress's purpose in enacting the PAEA. The PRC's suggestion that the Postal Service can reduce the unwarranted effects of its flawed analysis by creating a new "Metered mail" product is inconsistent with the statute and does not solve the problem that its flawed analysis creates. Even if the PRC could use this rulemaking to revisit its earlier finding that single piece and presort first-class mail have distinct cost or market characteristics, that finding was correct and confirms that the two products are not in a worksharing relationship. The Postal Service is aggrieved by the PRC's arrogation of the Postal Service's authority to set prices, including non- worksharing "discounts" or price differentials. The PRC's expansion of worksharing to include non- worksharing characteristics of the mail is contrary to the statute and should be set aside.

The study, which attempts to categorise how Britons communicate, reports that 17 percent of those surveyed said that they use email and text messages more than they did in 2010, while 30 percent reported writing fewer letters and posting fewer parcels, the Telegraph reported. Among those communications regulator Ofcom categorised as the most technology savvy, letter writing fell by up to 38 percent.
Express: Royal Mail moved closer to a £2billion float yesterday as it said rises in stamp prices and the online shopping boom had boosted profit. The Government-owned group, which employs 159,000 people, said preparations were now under way for a sale with all options open. It said it needed more cash to continue transforming its business away to parcels from letters, as more people are corresponding by email or text.
The Independent: It's been lost in the post for a while, but Royal Mail's £4bn privatisation project finally looks like an imminent delivery.
MarketingWeek: Royal Mail expects a rise in direct marketing as it looks to increase its share of the advertising market to boost profits.
BBC: Cut price Christmas stamps are being issued by Jersey Post on Thursday. The stamps, which are from the Charles Dickens Christmas issue, cost 50p instead of 55p for the UK stamp, and 40p reduced from 45p for the local postage stamp. The stamps can be used on letter-sized items until Monday 17 December. Andy Jehan, director of postal operations at Jersey Post, said the stamps could be used after that date if additional postage is paid.
Federal News Radio: When Nagisa Manabe arrived at the U.S. Postal Service six months ago, the agency was allocating just 5 percent of its total marketing dollars toward direct mail efforts aimed at promoting the agency's products and services.
Post & Parcel: Malta's postal regular has slapped a EUR 500 fine on local direct marketing company Mailbox Services Group for delivering mail that can only be delivered by MaltaPost under the country's postal monopoly rules. And, the Maltese Communications Authority (MCA) said if its suspicions were correct and the illegal postal delivery captured on camera was not a "one-off", Mailbox Services Group (MSG) could face further EUR 500 fines for every day it operates the service in future.
Bloomberg: Overshadowed by a political battle over year-end tax increases and spending cuts known as the fiscal cliff, the U.S. Postal Service could run out of money to deliver mail next year unless President Barack Obama and Congress act. The service, whose 530,000 employees are more than at any U.Sbased publicly traded company other than Wal-Mart Stores Inc. (WMT), has exhausted its borrowing authority, defaulted on more than \$11 billion of payments to the U.S. Treasury and is operating on cash it generates from selling stamps and package-delivery services. After streamlining delivery routes and cutting work hours, it's running out of money-saving tricks it can use without congressional approval. House and Senate proposals differ on whether to let the service eliminate one day of mail delivery and on how easy it should be to shut post offices and plants.
CEP News (Courier-Express-Postal), published by the MRU Consultancy, has reported that:
Post Nord, the merger of Post Danmark and Swedish Posten AB, faced a significant loss in operating profit in the first three quarters. Swiss Post backpedaled on its planned price hike for the distribution of newspapers and magazines. Private customers can buy regular stamps at half the price on the website of Dutch CheapSending. First they have to register themselves with this offer, which is funded by the
sponsoring of local companies. Afterwards customers can weekly buy either five stamps for standard letters with a rebate of 50% or five parcel stamps (for parcels weighing up to 10

kilograms) at a discount of 25%. The offer is to be launched via the website cheapsending.nl on December 1.
The Brazilian post will launch it first foreign subsidiary in spring 2013. After the government already paved the way for ECT Correios to expand abroad in 2011, the post now
announced to open a subsidiary in Miami.

Government Executive: A top House Republican remains optimistic that the lame-duck session of Congress will approve a comprehensive reform of the U.S. Postal Service. A spokesman for Rep. Darrell Issa, R-Calif., told Government Executive that the Oversight and Government Reform Committee chairman is hopeful Congress will work out a major overhaul to the Postal Service before the end of the year. "Chairman Issa is working toward and believes that comprehensive postal reform can be advanced this Congress," said Ali Ahmad, Issa's spokesman. Ahmad pointed to a letter Issa wrote to President Obama in September outlining his vision for the reform. "The postelection lame-duck session will provide a much greater window of opportunity to enact legislation to restore the Postal Service to solvency," Issa wrote. The agency has described the move as a necessary cost-saving measure because of declining mail volume as people and businesses continue switching to the Internet in place of letters and paper bills.
Wall Street Journal: The White House plans an aggressive public campaign to build support for its approach to reduce the deficit through tax increases and spending cuts, a sharp contrast to its private talks with Republicans that faltered last year. President Barack Obama will meet with labor leaders Tuesday and a number of chief executives on Wednesday, in an effort to solidify backing for his proposals.
Mother Jones: So far, the 112th Congress—the group of lawmakers elected in November 2010—has been the least productive in modern history, having passed the fewest number of bills of all Congresses since 1947, when such statistics started being compiled. That means there's still a lot on the legislative to-do list for the last few months before the 113th Congress begins in January—the period of time Washingtonians refer to as the "lame duck" session. Here are a few things Congress has on its plate.
Washington Post: Congress returns to work this week with important pieces of federal employee related legislation on the plate of the lame duck session. Congress has been trying to figure out how to keep the U.S. Postal Service afloat for years. The Senate passed a bipartisan bill in April. When the Senate acted, Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs Committee Chairman Joe Lieberman (I-Conn.) said "this legislation will change the USPS so it can stay alive throughout the 21st century to serve the people and businesses of this country." But the key sponsor of House legislation, Rep. Darrell Issa (R-Calif.), has called the Senate bill "wholly unacceptable," because he said the bill does not permit postal officials to quickly close facilities in order to save money.

Business Insider: Royal Mail is set to unveil a sharp jump in profits this week, clearing the way for a sell-off of the business next year. Officials and bankers working on the sale say Tuesday's figures are the crucial test of whether the business will be ready for a float in the third quarter of next year, which could raise £2bn, reports the Sunday Times. The paper reports that the government has already sanctioned a roadshow of prospective investors after Christmas. "That is the absolute key to the privatisation," one banker involved in the process told the Sunday Times.
Jamaica Gleaner: Threats, trickery and a possible explanation for the abduction and murder of two postal services workers have started to emerge as The Sunday Gleaner probes the use of the postal service by scammers. While there is yet no official link between the scammers and the killing of the two workers, officials of the postal service have confirmed that its employees have recieved threats from the scammers who want to use the mail system to collect the millions of dollars they fleece from foreigners.

New York Times: The United States Postal Service will experiment with same-day delivery of online orders in San Francisco. It sees the new option, called Metro Post, as a way to put its delivery infrastructure to fuller use while developing a new source of revenue — a matter of pressing importance as the service's finances go from bad to worse. The Postal Service proposes once-a-day pickup of goods ordered online from participating retailers in the city before 2 p.m. and delivery to homes between 4 and 8 p.m.
Intomobile: The largest social network in the world is now allowing users to use FedEx to ship items to their friends. The new service is called "Ship to Friends," and it offers shipping via a new Facebook app all within the site's interface. Members will not have to leave the site. The crazy thing is you can ship a package to anyone.
Xinhua: Express delivery firms say they are poised to handle record levels of business, on the back of an upcoming day that has become a shopping phenomenon in China. This Sunday, Nov 11, is Singles' Day - started on Chinese university campuses in the 1990s - when "singles" across the country try to find a partner. It has grown into a cultural event for many.
Galway Independent: A Galway TD has accused watchdog ComReg of pursuing a "neo-liberal, pro-privatisation agenda" towards An Post. Speaking after a meeting of the Joint Committee on Transport Communications yesterday, Labour Deputy Colm Keaveney said the performance of ComReg Chair Alex Chisholm and the substance of the matters in connection with his testimony at the meeting were "deeply worrying". He continuing to accuse ComReg of acting "in a manner that has played fast and loose with the public interest" by pursuing recent legal action against An Post.
Omaha World Herald: Severely cutting the retail window hours of 13,000 of the least-used post offices is a way for the U.S. Postal Service to address its serious funding shortage. But many Americans no doubt see it as the lesser of two evils. The greater evil, at least to many of the rural and small-town residents who depend on those little outposts of mail and sociability, would be to shut them down completely.
Federal Times: Even as the U.S. Postal Service prepares to announce record-setting year-end losses approaching \$15 billion next week, Congress appears unlikely to deliver on a comprehensive rescue bill this year. There are no concrete plans for reaching a final deal in the lame-duck session starting Nov. 13, according to a spokeswoman for Sen. Joe Lieberman, I-Conn., the lead sponsor of a Senate-passed measure that would give the Postal Service billions of dollars in financial relief.

John Cornyn (R-Texas), Kelly Ayotte (R-N.H.), John McCain (R-Ariz.), Rob Portman (R-Ohio), and Marco Rubio (R-Fla.) wrote to Defense Secretary Leon Panetta today, saying delays in sending ballots through the Military Postal Service Agency may rob thousands of service members of the right to have their ballots counted. The military has long struggled to get timely ballots to deployed troops who move frequently in theater, and MPSA has acknowledged the problem.
CTPost: Postal officials have announced that letter carriers from Inwood, Arverne, Rockaway Beach, Rockaway Park and Breezy Point will attempt to make deliveries in the Rockaways. Officials stress that the Rockaway Main Post Office will provide general delivery services — as it did on Monday — if mail carriers are unable to make a delivery Tuesday due to safety concerns. Customers should look for mail carriers to deliver in the following ZIP codes: 11691, 11692, 11693, 11694, 11697 and 11096. Post offices in Inwood, Arverne, Rockaway Beach and Rockaway Park remain temporarily closed.
KRZK: Officials with the U-S Postal Service say the results of a nationwide survey reveal that most rural communities prefer reduced hours verses the options of closure, relocation or roadside delivery. Richard Watkins is a USPS spokesperson for the Kansas City-based Mid America District. Watkins says in the five-year period between 2006 and 2011, the USPS realized some 200 million fewer visits to traditional post offices. He says the plan is to reduce service hours at 13-thousand post offices nationwide over the next two years.
AllAfrica: Tanzania Postal Bank (TBP) has posted a pre tax profit of 4.24bn/- in cumulative year ending this year's third quarter and putting alive expectation of meeting its annual target.
Post & Parcel: Royal Mail customers will be able to post items like aerosols, nail varnishes, perfumes and aftershaves to UK addresses from next year, after a review of rules banning such items from the postal network. • Domestic Air Mail Irregularities (FT-AR-12-015) Our report determined that domestic air mail irregularities processing was not effective because management did not monitor whether recording problems existed or whether claim deductions were calculated accurately and did not accurately calculate domestic air mail irregularity penalty amounts. In addition, U.S. Postal Service personnel did not always record irregularities for adjudication and assess applicable penalties when they occurred. Also, comprehensive written procedures for processing domestic air mail irregularities did not exist and penalty amounts were automatically calculated based on outdated contract data. These issues occurred because

- management did not consider this program a high priority and did not obtain data necessary to monitor the process.
- Officer Compensation for Calendar Year 2011 (Report Number FT-AR-13-001) Our audit determined that, although the Postal Service complied with Postal Service policies and guidelines and IRS regulations for calendar year 2011, it did not always comply with annual officer compensation caps as stated in the Postal Act of 2006. We believe failure to comply is a result of its misinterpretation of the relevant statutory authority in the Postal Act of 2006. Our findings are related to this misinterpretation.

Stars and Stripes: The ban on shipping electronics with rechargeable lithium batteries overseas through the U.S. Postal Service will likely end soon, but not before the holiday season is over.

Tucson Sentinel: Operating more like a business is precisely what the U.S. Postal Service has been directed to do ever since it was turned from a cabinet-level department to an independent federal agency in 1971. As the President's Commission on the United States Postal Service commented in 2003, "The Postal Service should be maintained as a public entity, but refocused and reorganized to enhance its efficiency and adaptability in the face of an uncertain, and ultimately more competitive, future." The Business Farmer: Rep. Adrian Smith (R-NE) Despite the importance of postal service in rural communities, USPS faces significant short- and long-term challenges. New technology has decreased the volume of mail, and USPS does not have the flexibility to adjust to a declining market. As a result, USPS missed a \$5.5 billion retiree health care payment on Aug. 1 and defaulted on a \$5.6 billion obligation on Sept. 30. In the coming months, Congress may consider passing a short-term measure so USPS can pay its bills, but ultimately the Postal Service needs robust reforms to address its long-term solvency. These reforms could include allowing for advertisement sales on postal vehicles and moving to cluster box delivery in both rural and urban communities. Post & Parcel: Two postal operators in Scandinavia have made acquisitions in the logistics field outside their home countries. Norway Post said on Wednesday it has acquired Swedish logistics company Ekdahls Åkeri. PostNord, the parent company of Sweden's Posten and Denmark's Post Danmark, said today that it has finalised its acquisition of Norwegian logistics company Harlem Transport AS. With letter volumes declining across the Nordic countries, parcels and logistics is seen as a key growth area for postal operators in the region.
BigPondNews: South Australia will save more than \$570,000 over the next three years after striking a better deal for postal services. Finance Minister Michael O'Brien said a whole-of-government contract had been signed with Australia Post for the first time. In the past each government agency or department negotiated its own agreement, diminishing their buying power. 'The new arrangement means that for the first time all 600-plus South Australian government account holders will have access to the best possible rates available from Australia Post,' Mr O'Brien said on Thursday.
Federal News Radio: Postmaster General Patrick Donahoe says his agency's losses for fiscal 2012 will be somewhere near \$15 billion when Q4 numbers are released in November — close to where the Postal Service projected they would be. The news comes a month after USPS hit

its \$15-billion borrowing limit from the Department of the Treasury, which means it's now relying completely on its own cash flow to support operations.

The company, which provides business communications software, mailing systems, services that integrate physical and digital communications channels and counts the Postal Service as a major client, has formed a new global e-commerce business group that will focus on growing its international e-commerce products and services. A prime goal will be to enhance cross-border parcel services to help retailers create a seamless online purchasing and shipping experience for consumers.
Marketwatch: Authorities in the Netherlands have extended the offer period for United Parcel Service Inc.'s UPS +0.31% proposed acquisition of Dutch rival TNT Express N.V. to no later than the end of February, the companies said. Under the extension from The Netherlands Authority for the Financial Markets, the offer period is extended until one week after clearances from the European Commission and the Chinese Ministry of Commerce have been obtained, but under no circumstances later than Feb. 28.
Wall Street Journal: Greece's Parliament narrowly approved a law Wednesday that gives the government greater flexibility to privatize the country's public utilities, but the fractious vote underscored a widening rift within the ruling coalition a week ahead of a critical debate on a multibillion austerity and reform package including Hellenic Petroleum SA, Public Power Corp., the state lottery company OPAP SA, the Athens and Thessaloniki water authorities, the Greek postal service, the Piraeus Port Authority SA and other ports around the country.
Wall Street Journal: As next week's election draws near, many Americans living abroad already may have cast their ballots in a new way: email. For the first time in a presidential election, many states this year allow all overseas voters and military personnel to cast ballots by email. The option to cast votes using email, instead of the postal system, is part of a national push to make it easier for citizens living overseas—particularly soldiers—to participate in elections. But critics, who include election officials, voting transparency groups and security researchers, say email voting could allow ballots to be intercepted and altered by hackers. Advocates believe the benefits of helping overseas citizens and soldiers receive and return ballots on time outweigh what they see as the remote risk of widespread tampering.

Philadelpha Inquirer: Households without mail service will be able to pick up Social Security checks beginning Thursday at open post offices nearby, the United States Postal Service said. Where regular mail service has resumed, those checks will be delivered as usual. Other mail will not be available at post office branches for households without normal mail delivery. Mail service has been restored to broad swaths of the region, spokespeople said, but road obstructions and utility outages make some areas inaccessible. People in Philadelphia can go to their local post office to pick up their checks, spokeswoman Cathy Yarosky said.
Government Executive: During a week when many people praised federal employees (e.g., the Federal Emergency Management Agency, the Coast Guard and the U.S. Postal Service) for doing their jobs exceptionally well, while others criticized Washington-area federal agencies for closing for two days, it's somewhat fitting that yet another analysis is out commenting on the pay gap between public and private sector workers.
